## Thank Goodness for Alders



Local logging roads open up easy access to mountain goat habitat. After roads are built, locals establish trails to alpine and mountain goats are often displaced. Luckily we have alders. Slowly they close the

logging road. It may take more than 10 years but locals get tired of clearing alders by hand and the road literally disappears, replaced by a green jungle.

Alders have saved the lives of innumerable mountain goats.

## **Humans as Super Predator**

Recent research has shown that fear of humans can affect the behaviour of large carnivores. The study took place in an urban area, so it may not apply directly to our backcountry. The study involves predators and not mountain goats. But the study has an connection to our discussion about dogs. In the study, humans are viewed by the predators as Super Predators, and dogs are simply an indirect cue for the presence of humans.

Do our mountain goats view humans as super predators? In our wilderness setting, are dogs seen by wildlife as both a direct threat and an indicator of the larger threat – humans? We have observed that mountain goats who have never seen humans behave differently than goats who are familiar with humans. Especially hunted goats. Something to think about.
